From the Rector's Desk .

Knowing me, you had to know it would end with music. I'm thinking of Carol Burnett's closing piece right now. I'm so glad we had this time together, just to have a laugh or sing a song. Seems we just got started, and before you know it, comes the time we have to say so long. Yet there has been so much more than a laugh or a song along the way, even though there have been more than a few of both. I will have been sixteen years in Holy Orders come October, and 75% of those years, a full three quarters, have been spent with you. There have been baptisms along the way, almost a hundred. I've been there for a hundred and twenty people as they were confirmed or received into the Episcopal Church. Twenty-nine marriages along the way, too, which helped boost the baptismal count! And forty-eight times the Burial Office was read. Thank you for letting me be a part of our shared experience these past dozen years.

A former secretary had this posted on her bulletin board: "Everyone brings joy to this office: some when they come, and some when they go." That's not a commentary on my retirement, I hope! But what I would say is that I've learned from almost everyone I've met along the way. Some of those lessons have been positive ones—for example, the Senior Warden who checked on me either by phone or in person almost every day during a lengthy recovery from serious illness. Others have been ... let's say, "less positive," but I have learned even from them.

There are a lot of folks to thank along the way, and I could not possibly name all of them. A few, though, deserve special mention. The Rev'd Dr. McAlister C. Marshall served as Rector of St. Asaph's Church, Bowling Green while I was pastor of Bowling Green Baptist Church. He and Doris became fast friends, and it was he who realized how utterly unhappy I was as a Baptist and opened the door with those memorable words: "Paul, I know you're miserable, but I think you'd make a damn fine priest!" Only time will tell if he was right or not, but he is also the one who made it possible for me to resign that cure and take the position of Pastoral Assistant to the Rector at Emmanuel, Brook Hill, Richmond, in early 2001, where I would remain until October 5, 2002, when I became Deacon-in-Charge of a two-church cure in Shenandoah County, Virginia.

I am grateful beyond words to The Rev'd Dr. E. Allen Coffey, who was the Rector of Emmanuel Church, Brook Hill when I arrived, who took me under his wing and nursed me back to (spiritual) health, who mentored me and treated me as a colleague. Allen—and the other six or seven priests-in-residence who served with him—taught me how to be a priest. One of them on staff there was The Rev'd Canon Dr. Reginald H. Fuller, perhaps the preeminent Anglican theologian of the last half of the 20th century. A two-hour trip driving him to seminary was worth a semester there! I am also deeply appreciative of the good people of Emmanuel, Brook Hill who welcomed me, encouraged me, taught me, and took me in.

In their 2017 book, THE ARMED FORCES OFFICER (Washington, DC: National Defense University Press, 2017, p. 16), Richard M. Swain and Albert C. Pierce wrote this: "Like the priesthood, the profession of arms is a vocation, a higher calling, to serve others, to sacrifice self, to be about something larger than one's own ambitions and desires, something grander than one's own contributions, and even one's own life." It has been a distinct privilege to have served my country as a member of that profession for almost eight years. It is an honorable one. Being part of that "band of [mostly] brothers" has shaped and colored my adult life. "Duty, honor, country" are more than just words; as General Douglas MacArthur said in his farewell speech, "those three hallowed words reverently dictate what you ought to be, what you can be, what you will be." I hope they are also what I have been.

Shortly before Christmas, 1980, home on leave from Ft. Knox, my mother invited me to her Sunday School's class party. There was a young woman, she said, whom she'd like me to meet. On August 8 this year that young woman and I will celebrate our 37th anniversary of marriage. Across thirteen houses, three states, seven churches, three denominations, three degrees, six dogs, three (or more!) cats, several personal tragedies—I could go on like this for a while—she has been "a strength in need, a counselor in perplexity, a comfort in sorrow, and a companion in joy" (BCP 429). There are simply no words sufficient to express my love and appreciation. As Dag Hammarskjold said, "For all that has been, thanks; for all that will be, yes!"

The year started with the annual business meeting in January, where we planned out the year's events and elected officers.

February followed with the ever-so-fun Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper, where the youth prepared a nourishing and delicious meal, and festivities for the parishioners. The youth enjoyed a fun outing of togetherness and fellowship in March where they tested their problem-solving skills at the Escape Room in Williamsburg and finished with a meal at *Chick-fil-A*.

April was the perfect month for a day of playing in the dirt and spreading mulch in the Youth Herb and Cutting Garden. It was concluded with a business meeting. May was an "off" month. St. Peter's Restoration Association Update

As you may know, the Restoration Association was organized in 1922, and after many years of fundraising and consulting with architectural and ecclesiological experts both here and in England, the church building was elegantly and painstakingly restored in 1964 to its colonial appearance.

Since that time the association's goal has been mostly one of preservation. This summer of 2018 marks the three hundred and fifteenth year the church building has been in use. It is the oldest Parish in the Diocese of Virginia and the fourth oldest in the Commonwealth of Virginia.

Our annual celebration of the association's efforts will take place this year on September 16. Please consider joining us as we welcome John Ericson, a Museum Interpreter and Outreach Coordinator for Historic St. Luke's Church, a museum of the oldest church building in Virginia. Mr. Ericson is also Pastor of Reformation Lutheran Church in Newport News. He will discuss the topic of Religion and the American Revolution. The day will include a forum led by Mr. Ericson at 10 am, worship service at 11 am, where he will be the guest speaker, and a picnic on the church grounds afterwards.

Please plan to join us for this special day—Restoration Sunday—as we celebrate 315 years at St. Peter's.

Thank you for supporting the association with your ticket purchase and or donation to our birthday party for Martha Washington. The organization of this event was a labor of love for us, as we believe wholeheartedly in the historic preservation of St. Peter's Episcopal Church. Thanks to your generosity, the association was bolstered in its continuing efforts to maintain the integrity of this historic building. The event was most successful, having profits greater than \$10,000. It is the hope of the Restoration Board to have additional events in the future. Thank you again for your support and to the Martha Washington Birthday Party Committee, chaired by Jayne Pinelli.

Remembering our Veterans

Edward Baldwin McCaul, (1924–1981), father of Marianne Powell, was born and grew up in Hartford, Connecticut. He enlisted in the Navy in September of 1941, at the age of 17. After basic training, he reported to the *USS Milwaukee (CL-5)* in the Brooklyn Navy Yard, and was on board when Pearl Harbor was attacked. The third ship to bear the name *Milwaukee*, CL-5 was a light cruiser with a length of 555'6", draft of 13'6" and a speed of 34 knots. An Omaha class cruiser, she had 10-21 inch torpedo tubes, 12 six inch guns, and was fitted with a powerful echo sounder. She was built at a cost of \$7,500,000 and commissioned on June 20, 1923, at Tacoma, Washington. Seaman McCaul was trained as a radio operator and conducted his job while flying in a <u>Vought OS2U Kingfisher</u>, a catapult launched observation airplane with a large center float and two smaller side floats for emergency landings and recovery operations from water. Radiomen serving on Kingfisher aircraft had the additional duties of observation and defending the plane with two ring mounted .30 Cal, Browning M1919 machine guns.

Although the *Milwaukee* served primarily in the Southern Atlantic Patrol Area, based and replenished out of Recife, Brazil, she was assigned to other targeted missions as well. She was used as an early warning scout ship during the invasion of North Africa and while serving on convoy escort duty in the North Atlantic, she recovered the crew of a destroyed German U-Boat. Her log book records 21 passages through the Panama Canal and crossing the Equator 44 times! In May of 1943, while in Recife harbor for repairs, the crew of the Milwaukee, including Seaman McCaul, helped to fight a catastrophic fire on the *SS Livingston Roe*, a fuel tanker from the civilian Esso fleet. Three American sailors and several Brazilian harbor workers were fatally injured in this event. The *Milwaukee* was loaned to the Russians in 1944 for the duration of the war. When this happened, Petty Officer McCaul was assigned to a US Navy radio station in Recife. This station controlled communications for US Naval ships in the Atlantic. As part of their additional duties, the men patrolled the Recife harbor area, carrying only .45 caliber pistols. Petty Officer McCaul served in the US Navy for the entire duration of World War II, until October 1945. After his discharge, he settled in Washington, DC, where he attended the Capitol Radio Engineering Institute (CREI). While there, he met and married Edith Wall. They had three children.

Mr. McCaul's postwar employment career as a civilian included: working as a cameraman for NBC in Washington, DC; working at the government installation known as Mount Weather in Winchester, Virginia; working at the burn unit at Fort Sam Houston, where films were made of soldiers sent back from Vietnam; and working as a CRYPTO (secure communications) control officer for Air Force One, based at Andrews Air Force Base. On his retirement, he and his wife moved to New Kent County to be closer to their children. Life long Episcopalians, they joined St. Peter's and he attended services until his death in 1981.

We give thanks for the life and service of Edwin Baldwin McCaul.
