On September 8, we will return to our regular worship schedule at 9 and 11 am, with Christian Education at 10 am. The Rt. Rev. David Jones will be with us that day for confirmation and reception. The following Sunday, September 15, is Restoration Sunday, and the newly retired Rector of Grace Church, Yorktown, Carleton Bakkum will be our presenter and preacher. Grace is the second oldest church in the Commonwealth and we are third. I look with interest to what he will tell of his time there and what he has learned about ministry. I had my name in there but Carleton was called, and I was called to St. Peter's and the rest is history as they say!

Wardens' Corner

Many of us ask, "What does stewardship really mean?" We have learned that stewardship is "using the gifts that God gives us to do the work God calls us to do." I believe that stewardship further means that we are not owners of things, but managers. In other words, God owns it all, we are all stewards, and we all have the responsibility to manage resources for His glory.

In 1 Corinthians 4:2 we are reminded, "Moreover, it is required of stewards that they be found faithful"; to be faithful, the Vestry must be knowledgeable of the things that they manage. At St. Peter's, these things include the historic Church, the Parish House, an endowment, and money contributed during the Annual Giving Campaign. When you give, the Vestry is responsible for the diligent care of these gifts. In order for the Vestry to diligently manage the money God has given us, the Vestry establishes an annual spending budget.

The Vestry discusses the gifts we receive from God and is mindful about how we are called to use them. The Vestry has charged the Budget and Finance Committee to establish both an annual budget and future costs projections. I serve on this committee and honestly, budgeting is challenging. Even though St. Peter's is a vibrant church, contributions have declined since 2016.

Ideally, the Vestry seeks to establish a balanced budget. The long-standing objective of the Vestry has been to establish an annual spending budget in alignment with the gifts received through the Annual Giving Campaign. This is challenging because pledge income has not risen sufficiently to support the budget. Approximately 70% of the budget is allocated to provide for our Rector and staff members who are critical to the mission of the church. The direct cost of our ministries and contributions to the Diocese of Virginia are approximately 10%. The remaining 20% of costs include utilities, property and liability insurance, building and grounds maintenance, and office operations.

St. Peter's receives financial support from both the St. Peter's Parish Foundation and the St. Peter's Restoration Association to fund the costs of major building and grounds projects. Examples of major projects include the driveway and parking lot paving, the Richardson Hall renovation, and new heating and cooling systems. Therefore, the costs of major building and grounds projects are not included in the annual spending budget.

The largest source of income for the church is its members, and pledging is vital for the church's financial stability and planning. Because only 75% of the income from our members is pledged, planning is made more difficult. As always, our goal as a parish will be to pledge enough gifts though the 2020 Annual Giving Campaign to support our annual spending budget.

Have you ever wondered why the Bible says that "God loves a cheerful giver"? (2 Corinthians 9:7) I believe that joyful giving is a sign that givers understand the owner-manager relationship. God loves a cheerful giver because such givers are investing in the work God calls us to do.

From your Discernment Committee, we have learned that you desire a spiritually focused, forward thinking parish that treasures our history, but wants to focus on "what we do" and not just where we do it. Please begin to discern your giving for the 2020 Annual Giving Campaign, because these funds are the support for "what we do."



Starting Sunday, October 20, Steve von Hitritz will be moderating a new class which will run through November 24, take a break for Advent and Christmas, then restart on January 5 and go through March 15, for a total of 17 Sundays. He will co-moderate with Lisa Guthrie.

We will be studying the book, The Universal Christ: How a Forgotten Reality Can Change Everything We See, Hope For, and Believe, by Richard Rohr, and do one chapter each Sunday. Following is an overview:



In his decades as a globally recognized teacher, Richard Rohr has helped millions realize what is at stake in matters of faith and spirituality. Yet Rohr has never written on the most perennially talked about topic in Christianity: Jesus. Most know who Jesus was, but who was Christ? Is the word simply Jesus' last name? Too often, Rohr writes, our understanding has been limited by culture, religious squabbling, and the human tendency to put ourselves at the center.

Drawing on scripture, history, and spiritual practice, Rohr articulates a transformative view of Jesus Christ as a portrait of God's constant, unfolding work in the world. "God loves things by becoming them," he writes, and Jesus' life was meant to declare that humanity has never been separate from God – except by its own negative choice. When we recover this fundamental truth, faith becomes less about proving Jesus was God, and more about learning to recognize the Creator's presence all around us and in everyone we meet.

Thought-provoking, practical, and full of deep hope and vision, THE UNIVERSAL CHRIST is a landmark book from one of our most beloved spiritual writers, and an invitation to contemplate how God liberates and loves all that is.

We Salute Our Veterans – Samuel H. Apperson

Samuel H. Apperson was born in New Kent County on May 16, 1841. He was a member of St. Peter's Parish and volunteered early in the Civil War joining Company F of the Third Virginia Cavalry.

The Virginia 3rd Cavalry was organized with independent companies and entered Confederate service on July 1, 1861. The regiment was formed with eleven companies, later reduced to ten. It was also called 2nd Regiment until October 1861. Its members were raised in the counties of Mecklenburg, Elizabeth City, New Kent (exclusively to Company F), Halifax, Nottoway, Cumberland, Dinwiddie, and Prince Edward.

For a time, six companies served in the Department of the Peninsula and four in the Valley District. Later, the unit was assigned to General F. Lee's, Wickham's, and Munford's Brigade, Army of Northern Virginia. It fought in many conflicts from Williamsburg to Fredericksburg, then was involved in the engagements at Kelly's Ford, Chancellorsville, Brandy Station, Upperville, Gettysburg, Bristow, Mine Run, The Wilderness, Todd's Tavern, Spotsylvania, Haw's Shop, and Cold Harbor. The 3rd went on to participate in Early's operations in the Shenandoah Valley and the Appomattox Campaign.

The 3rd Virginia Cavalry took 210 effectives to Gettysburg, but only three surrendered on April 9, 1865. However, the number who surrendered were the remnants of those left behind after the Regiment cut its way through Union Lines and eventually disbanded instead of surrendering at Appomattox—brave warriors even after defeat was inevitable.

Private Apperson rose to the rank of Sergeant and was mustered out of service at the close of the war. He lived another 38 years, passing in 1903 at the age of 62.

We give thanks and honor the service and memory of Sgt. Samuel H. Apperson among those members of our Parish who served their country.

We became the best of friends from kindergarten through college; I will never forget her infectious smile and glowing personality that was so special to me and so many others.

In our seven short years of conducting this golf tournament, we have made remarkable strides in building the program in Sarah's memory. On our second year, we endowed a \$50,000 scholarship at William & Mary and awarded our first scholarship from the college on the third year and every year since. Our seventh year was outstanding and because of your support we awarded <u>six</u> more scholarships to graduating seniors in New Kent. Combined with last year's awards, we have now given a total of 20 scholarships to New Kent students totaling \$33,000.

We want to continue to grow the Foundation from your continuing participation in this annual golf tournament and from the wonderful gifts and donations that we have been so fortunate to receive each year. We will continue to award the William & Mary scholarships each year, as well as scholarships for New Kent students. Beginning this year, we want to enlarge Sarah's vision by planning churches and Hope Centers for children, in partnership with the International Cooperating Ministries organization. With Sarah's faith being such an integral part of her life, this support of ICM is a natural enlargement of the Charitable Trust.

Communications Committee Announces a New Notification System



A new notification system is being implemented at St. Peter's to replace the informal, but aging, phone tree system that has been used in years past. The Communications Committee has organized a rollout of the system that began mid-July with initial service expected to start by the first of September.

The system, OneCallNow®, is used by churches, school districts, county governments, and businesses around the world to provide almost instant messaging service to their members. Messages to St. Peters' parishioners will be sent by phone call, emails, and text messaging. Any or all methods can be selected by recipients to ensure that vital information gets passed to them quickly and efficiently in whatever channel or combination of methods is preferred.

Formal registration started July 11 and will continue through mid-August. Parishioners will be contacted either in person at various church events or by email and asked to confirm existing email addresses and phone numbers. Contact information can also be sent to the new email address that has been set up—stpeters.onecall@gmail.com—and future changes to individual information can be sent to the same service.

Messages will be of two types:

- Routine announcements about current and planned events will be sent out as appropriate to keep the congregation informed on a regular basis.
- Emergency notices will be sent in cases of inclement weather or last-minute changes to previously planned activities.

In addition to having the capability of sending messages to everyone, subgroups of church organizations will be formed (the Vestry, Choir, Altar Guilds, Foundation, Matthews Haven, to name a few) and tailored messages can be sent to the members of those subgroups alone, to avoid excessive message traffic to all of our parishioners.

Registration forms for contact information will be available in the Parish House foyer through mid-August. Forms can be emailed to stpeters.onecall@gmail.com, left at the Church Office, or given to any member of the Communications Committee or the Vestry.

Future articles will describe other features of this system as they become available.
