From the Interim Rector's Desk

While the rest of the world is running amok, singing Christmas carols and songs since before Halloween, the Church is on Kairos time, God's time, and it is saying—be quiet, not yet! I've had parishioners over the years question me incessantly about why we can't hang wreaths with red ribbons like others do. Or why can't we decorate since we look like the Grinch. Because it is Advent! That time of quiet reflection, but more important, that time of preparation to welcome the Lord. Something that isn't rushed. Because it's not about preparing the surroundings, it's about preparing our hearts to receive the greatest gift that God has given us. It's easy to move furniture, and dust, but to ready our hearts, to get rid of those hurts, angers, failings, that keep us from loving is so much harder and requires more time to do so.

Advent is a double preparation in that we prepare for Jesus' first coming, his birth, and look toward his second coming in power and glory. **Christ has died, Christ is risen, Christ will come again.** It is also the beginning of a new liturgical year: Year C and the Gospel readings mostly from Luke.

This year we will light the Advent candles by having a Church School class light a candle and lead us in a short ceremony explaining that week's candle and having an appropriate prayer. We will hear again in the Service of Advent Lessons and Carols, the marvelous works of God in Christ. And in the Christmas Pageant we will see enacted the story of his birth. At the 5 o'clock service, the Lukan narrative is read, and we will sing carols while children process the figures to the crèche on the altar. It is a story after all that most of us can recite by heart. "In those days there went out a decree..."

As we prepare to welcome our Lord, we also prepare to welcome our new Rector whenever that may be. As I said several Sundays ago, one of the ways to welcome is to ensure that our parish grounds are ready to do so. Before you move your furniture into your new house, it makes sense to paint and ready it beforehand, much less messy and how nice not to have to deal with all the covering and working around the furniture. So we will deal with all the mess now and get bids to do the parking lot, and the handicap access walk from the Parish House to the Church. Thus the new Rector can get on with the ministry and goals we have set. I deeply appreciate the Vestry's willingness to accomplish these tasks now.

It is a time of expectation and excitement, as we look to celebrate Jesus, our Lord, and to the person that He will send to continue to assist us to accomplish all that He would call us to do!



We Salute our Veterans

Captain Isaac Tyree, born in New Kent County in 1788, died July 3, 1858, and served his country in the War of 1812 as a Private in the 52d (Christian's) Regiment.

The Regular Army of the United States was very small prior to the War of 1812, fewer than 30,000 members. The young nation depended on local (state) militias to provide manpower in the event of war. The Virginia militia was organized by county, with each county producing one or more regiments. Each regiment typically took the name of its Commanding Officer, a Colonel. This person quite often paid for the uniforms and supplies required by "his" regiment.

Regiments were in turn organized into twenty-one brigades, and the brigades were organized into four divisions. Each state had an Adjutant-General, nominally the Commander of the State Militia when the President called it up for Federal service, much like today's National Guard. With the outbreak of war in 1812, President Madison called up the states militias, with each state satisfying a particular quota. Virginia furnished 65,354 infantry men, 8,803 cavalymen, 7,698 artillerymen, and 10,036 men in miscellaneous troops for a total of 91,891 men. Virginia did not grant bounty land or pension for military service during this war. The pension or bounty was provided by the United States.

Captain Tyree is somewhat of an enigma in that very few records can be located about his life in New Kent or his service to his country. To compound those mysteries, he is buried in an unmarked grave in St. Peter's Cemetery. But, based on what we have been able to determine, Isaac Tyree continued to serve his community after his service to his country. We located a record of the [Virginia General Assembly- House of Delegates](#) from 1846 that showed Isaac Tyree as one of the Commissioners of Schools for New Kent County. Parish and census records from that same time indicate that he was a farmer and a contributing member to his community, most likely from his ancestral home at Tyree's Plantation (1655) located on the Barhamsville Road in eastern New Kent. Our assumption is that he remained in the Virginia Militia following the War of 1812, and eventually assumed command of a local company, which would have been comprised of neighbors in a small community in New Kent County, thus attaining the rank of Captain as a Company Commander.

We give thanks for the life and service of Captain Isaac Tyree. In the next issue, we will look at the service records of another veteran from St. Peter's Parish Church. From the Discernment Committee

The process of finding our new Rector may seem slow and deliberate, but it is an exciting and invigorating time for our parish. It is a chance for each of us to reflect on the gifts God has given us through our beloved St. Peter's Parish Church, and more importantly, it is a time to look forward to what we can become.

The discernment process is built on three questions:

Who have we been? Who are we now? Who is God calling us to be?

Some of our long-time St. Peter's members graciously answered questions to help the discernment committee appreciate the importance of our history and legacy, the *Who we have been?* The committee spent time studying the operations and organizations that make up our church to identify *Who are we now?*

Currently, the committee is developing ideas to speak to as many parishioners as possible about what St. Peter's means to us today, and *Who is God calling us to be?* You may be given two or three questions on an index card at an upcoming service. You may be asked to participate in a listening session. A committee member may ask to attend your next commission meeting to hold a small, short focus group session. Note of Appreciation

St. Peter's Family,

Thank you all so very much for your concerns, texts, e-mails and especially the cards you sent all the way to Germany throughout the time I was hospitalized and through my rehabilitation.

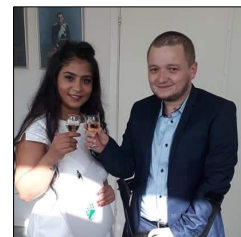
For those who might not know, I was injured in a Munich subway accident on June 24 of this year. It was silly of me to slip on the side of the walk-way but it was 5 am and I had just gotten off work and I was very tired. Unfortunately for me, a train was entering the station when I slipped. The train severed my left leg above the foot and I suffered a head injury as well as lacerations to my right foot, a vertebrae injury, and a contusion of my right lung. I spent over two months in the hospital, three weeks of which I spent in a medically-induced coma.

I was truly blessed to have the love of my life Veronica at my side throughout this time as well as her sister Camilla. My mom was there for me in June and July and my dad was there from June 27 to September 27. All four of them were there when I emerged from the coma in July. Almost from the first day in the hospital, I started receiving letters from my friends at St. Peter's and some folks at church I've not yet met, having left to join in the Army in 2012.

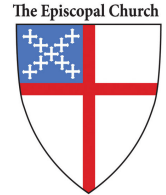
So, the good news is that I finished my first round of rehabilitation on October 24, with more to follow, and I plan to go back to work as soon as my doctor releases me. I now walk with a prosthetic foot and one crutch. I married the love of my life Veronica Manole in Aero, Denmark on October 17. On October 23, we submitted the first of four applications for Veronica to obtain a visa to the United States. It is a lengthy process. We hope to have her visa in hand by early March and move back to New Kent in late March or early April. Our plan is to live with my Dad for a while, and both of us want to work in the local area. I plan to attend Virginia College in Richmond and pursue a two-year degree in network and systems administration.

Again, so many thanks to my St. Peter's family.

Report on the 224th Annual Diocesan Convention ~ November 1-3

(Attended by The Rev. Dr. Doug Wigner and Allan Fabritz)

As most of you know already from the special email that was sent out, and from the diocesan magazine *Virginia Episcopalian*, Bishop Shannon Johnston has resigned in order to take an early retirement. He stated that he felt he has met his goals in accomplishing the vision he had brought to the diocese; also he has some personal and family reasons.

The Standing Committee has been searching for a candidate to be a Bishop Provisional until a new Bishop Diocesan is elected, but has not been successful yet. Comments from the floor expressed a desire of some to move ahead with the search for a new Diocesan rather than to continue looking for a Provisional. Meanwhile, Bishop Suffragan Susan Goff has full ecclesiastical authority. A resolution was passed to allow her to appoint, with the consent of the Standing Committee, an Assistant Bishop under such conditions as she determines. She has expressed plans to hold a series of meetings around the diocese to listen to our concerns and opinions on these matters regarding the leadership of the diocese.

A special fund has been established in honor of Bishop Shannon Johnston to support programs for Youth and Young Adults. *The Virginia Episcopalian* has information on contributing to the fund.

A resolution was adopted on "Way of Love" Rule of Life to move forward with Presiding Bishop Michael Curry and General Convention's priorities set forth for the next three years: Evangelism, Racial Reconciliation, and Care of Creation. Bishop Curry has set forth a series of steps for each of us to do this, with the lead words: *Turn, Learn, Pray, Worship, Bless, Go, Rest.*

A resolution was adopted supporting the Tree of Life Synagogue in Pittsburgh by condemning anti-Semitism, reaffirming George Washington's support for liberty of conscience, commending interfaith work, and urging attendance at local synagogue Shabbat services.

There was a presentation on the Triangle of Hope, where there has been a revival of the relationship of the Diocese of Virginia with those in Kumasi, Ghana and Liverpool, England. There are or will be exchanges of Youth Pilgrims among the three dioceses. The Rev. Andrew Merrow of St. Mary's, Arlington was re-elected to the Standing Committee. Also elected were the Rev. Barbara "Bambi" Willis of Trinity, Fredericksburg, Ashley Cameron of St. Mary's, Goochland, and Christie Thomas of St. Paul's Memorial at UVA, Charlottesville.

A reduced budget, due unfortunately to slightly lower parish contributions than expected, of \$4,935,000 was adopted.
