From the Rector's Desk



"Behold, I am doing a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert." ~ *Isaiah 43:19*

When I go out into creation and hike through the woods, I am continually reminded that our God is a God of new beginnings. I am grateful to God and the Vestry of St. Peter's for calling me to make a new beginning in this community of faith. Although you're reading this in late November, it was written within the first week of my time as your new priest and Rector. In those short few days, you've made me feel welcome in myriad ways. I've had conversations with you after worship, over coffee, in my office, or at a shared meal. Several of you have written me notes or brought small tokens of affection: a flower, fresh produce from your garden or delicious eggs from your chickens. I've received many warm handshakes and encouraging words. Thank you.

In the months leading up to a new call, priests enter a period of discernment. We spend time in prayer, seeking to perceive how the Holy Spirit is at work in our lives, and where God is leading us. It's an essential element of priesthood that priests are sent from wherever they were raised up, and go out into the world. We come from one place, and we go out into another. When I first visited St. Peter's, I knew I was leaving the place where I had been, but I simultaneously felt that I was coming home. I believe that this is the place to which God has called me. This is the new thing that God is doing in my life, and in yours. My response is a feeling of deep gratitude and hope. I hope to be faithful to God and my new call. I hope to joyfully serve you, the church into which I have been called. I hope to build new relationships in the community and to develop a deep and abiding love for each of you, the people of this parish.

Hope leaves room for adaptability and space for the movement of the Holy Spirit. It is a faithful anticipation of a future yet unknown. God is up to something new, in my own life and in the life of St. Peter's. Do you perceive it? With God, all things are possible. God makes new paths, and brings life-giving water to places that had been dry. During the season of Advent, we spend time in prayer and preparation for the new things God is bringing into the world. It began 2,000 years ago with preparations for a baby. In the years since then during this season, the church has lit candles in the darkness, more each week, as we prepare ourselves for the new beginnings marked by celebrations of the birth of Christ. I hope you'll spend time during this busy season looking out into the world and trying to perceive the new things that God is calling you to, both personally and as the body of Christ in this particular place.

As we light candles during the darkest nights of the year, dream about the places God is bringing new light into the world. Spend time, as Mary did, pondering these things in your hearts. We are an historic church and a long-standing congregation. It gives us a deep grounding in the past and the traditions of the church. At the same time, St. Peter's is a church facing the future, waiting in hopeful anticipation to see where God is calling us next. I give thanks to God for you and for the warm welcome I've received. I'm grateful to be walking the way with you.

Wardens' Corner

As Junior Warden, I have been charged with caring for St. Peter's buildings and grounds, and I have spent time this year organizing our files. While doing this, I find myself getting side tracked by reading about the history of the church's construction and restoration. Recently, I came across a note written by Chap Harrison that simply stated: "The Restoration was completed in 1964 and Christmas Eve midnight service was held there. The Rev. Edward W. Eanes, Rector, preached the sermon." This note sparked my curiosity. I was able to confirm in the REGISTER OF CHURCH SERVICES that the last service held in the church prior to the interior restoration was on January 5, 1964. The first service in the restored church was on December 20, 1964, and was Morning Prayer with ninety-seven people in attendance. This was followed on December 24 with Holy Eucharist at 11:15pm, the midnight service, with eighty-four people in attendance.

Until I found this note, I was not aware that our services returned to the church during one of the holiest times of the year. December brings with it the liturgical season of Advent, that time of quiet reflection, but more important, that time of preparation to welcome the Lord. It's the time to prepare our hearts to receive the greatest gift that God has given us. I am sure that much time and care was spent preparing for the first service in the church after the interior restoration, especially since it was during this season of expectation and excitement. I feel confident in saying this because of the traditions that we continue today to prepare for Advent and Christmas.

At St. Peter's, many things are in store for us as we try to enter more deeply into the spirit of the season. In Advent, we'll see the purple liturgical hangings and the Advent wreath with evergreens and four candles surrounding the Christ candle. All of this to remind us visibly of the emptiness of our lives without our Lord, and the new light and new horizons which God reveals to us.

I feel blessed that we have many traditions to participate in together as we celebrate the birth of Jesus. These include the Hanging of the Greens, Advent Wreath Making, Lessons & Carols, Christmas Pageant, Give a Child a Christmas, Samaritan's Purse Shoe Boxes, Christmas Wreaths for Veterans, Caroling, and Christmas Craft Day.

It is a time of expectation and excitement, as we look to celebrate Jesus, our Lord! A blessed Christmas to you all.

St. Peter's Vestry Nominations



We Salute Our Veterans – LTC Thomas Claiborne

LTC Thomas Claiborne was born on August 17, 1647, the son of William and Elizabeth (Butler) Claiborne. William Claiborne was a very successful Virginia trader who originally came to Virginia in 1621 as the appointed surveyor for the young colony. Late in the 1620s, he opened a trading post on Kent Island on the Chesapeake Bay. But, later in the 1630s, when successive Lords Baltimore claimed Kent Island as part of the Maryland Colony, he was expelled and returned to Virginia where he was named Secretary of the Colony, second in power only to the Governor.

William Claiborne established the plantation Romancoke, just north of the present day Town of West Point, where he organized and was responsible for forming "New" Kent County in 1654.

Thomas Claiborne followed in his father's footsteps by serving in the Virginia Militia while also serving as a member of the county court. Both father and son defended the Crown during the Indian Wars and Bacon's Rebellion in 1676, but at great expense and financial loss to the family.

In spite of relatively peaceful relationships with the local Indian Tribes after 1680, Thomas was wounded by an arrow and died several days later on October 7, 1683, at the age of 36. According to most records, Thomas was buried on the family plantation at Romancoke.

What seems to be a contradiction in history is the marker in St. Peter's Church cemetery that is actually a memorial marker (not a grave marker) for LTC Claiborne and his third wife, Sarah C. Fenn, placed by The Claiborne Society in 2009. Sarah Fenn Claiborne was a member of St. Peter's Parish Church until her death in 1716.

In 1926, all of the Claiborne ancestors and wives were moved from Romancoke to Hollywood Cemetery in Richmond where they remain interred.

We give thanks for the life and service of the Claiborne family in the early years of Virginia's history.

Sarah's Memorial Golf Tournament—Thank You!

The 8th Annual *Sarah's Memorial Golf Tournament* was held at the Club at Viniterra golf course on September 27 and was an overwhelming success! Again, the program exceeded all expectations by growing its scholarship opportunities for the College of William & Mary students and for graduating seniors in New Kent County.

Sarah passed away in November 2011 with a rare form of adrenal cancer. She was a former teacher of New Kent Middle School, an alumnus of the College of William & Mary, and a faithful member of St. Peter's. Since the program began, six scholarships have been awarded at William & Mary and 20 scholarships have been granted to New Kent seniors, totaling \$33,000.

Over 100 golfers participated in this year's tournament at Viniterra along with 56 hole sponsors, 11 tournament sponsors, and 74 prize contributors and supporters. The food, the fun, the friendly competition, and the prizes were truly the order of the day. So many supporters joined together for this wonderful achievement!

In addition to the continued scholarships, an effort to enlarge Sarah's vision of planting churches and Hope Centers for children, in partnership with the International Cooperating Ministries organization, began this year. The success of this year's tournament will enable the new goal to come to fruition this year. More detailed information will be forthcoming.

Unquestionably, the major reason for the continuing growth of this spectacular program rests with the efforts and prayers of the St. Peter's family. We sincerely thank everyone for their participation and look forward to seeing everyone again next year.

A Few Fun Facts about St. Peter's

St. Peter's **PARISH HOUSE** was erected in 1963 to the Glory of God and in Memory of Richard Cunningham Richardson, 1902-1961. The Parish House is home to the Offices, the Education Wing, the Nursery, Richardson Hall and the Kitchen, the Mullins Assembly Room, Martha's Gift Shoppe, the Music Room, the Matthew's Haven Room, and the Restrooms.

RICHARDSON HALL is the fellowship hall where parishioners gather for Coffee Hour and other events held in the Parish House. Mr. Richardson's picture is displayed there.

The **EDUCATION WING** was erected in 1994 to the Glory of God and in Loving Memory of Helen Schrantz Fleet by S. Douglas Fleet. This wing is home to the Church School classrooms, the Nursery, the Music Room, and the Matthew's Haven Room.

The MULLINS ASSEMBLY ROOM, also referred to as "The Mullins Room," was given in Loving Memory of their parents, William R. and Ellen McCoy Mullins, by Lewis M. Mullins, George E. Mullins, Marie M. Culbreth, Edna M. McKinney, Ella M. Phipps, Ida M. Owens, and Marjorie Richardson Goodall. This room is used for many purposes, including: Adult Forum, Vestry Meetings, and as a Gathering Place for families having baptisms, burial offices, visitations, and a place for bridal parties to prepare for weddings.

Report of 225th Annual Diocesan Convention

In mid-November, more than 450 clergy and lay delegates from across the Diocese of Virginia gathered in Arlington, Virginia for the 225th Annual Convention of the Diocese of Virginia. During their ordinations, priests vow to participate in the councils of the Church. Annual Convention is the most important of these councils. This year, in addition to the Rev. Wickersham, the delegate from St. Peter's was Matt Danielson. Delegates to Convention have several responsibilities including the election of leaders to governing bodies, passing a budget for the upcoming year, and voting on any resolutions that come before Convention.

Five new people were elected to the Diocesan Standing Committee, which serves as a council of advice to the Bishop. Additionally, deputies to General Convention and Provincial Synod were elected. Delegates to Convention passed four resolutions this year. The first calls for making efforts to discontinue the use of single-use plastic and foam products. The second was a newly amended Diocesan Alcohol Use Policy. The third urged local, state, and federal water authorities to reconsider the location and routing of a water intake site to avoid Monacan Nation ancestral village and grave sites. The fourth called for increased transparency and reporting of progress toward achieving pay equity for stipendiary clergy by gender and race.

On the second day, the Rt. Rev. Susan Goff, Bishop Suffragan and Ecclesiastical Authority gave her pastoral address. In it, she outlined a timeline towards consecrating a new Bishop Diocesan. She will call for the election of the next Bishop Diocesan at Diocesan Convention in 2020. The consecration of the Bishop Elect will likely occur in late summer or early fall of 2022. Bishop Goff plans to retire in 2023. In a recorded video address, Presiding Bishop Michael Curry expressed his support for the timeline and plan. The Diocese's new Assistant Bishop Jennifer Brooke-Davidson was introduced. She joined the Diocese on November 4. She was previously the Bishop Suffragan in the Diocese of West Texas. Bishop Associate Robert Ihloff made his parting address toward the close of Convention. He will return to the Diocese of Maryland in January of 2020 to serve as a part-time Assistant Bishop.

Convention concluded with a service of Holy Eucharist presided over by all of the bishops, several priests, and assisted by many deacons.
