

As we return to our fall schedule, I thought we should pause and give thanks for all that the Lord has blessed us with this past year. The Discernment Committee is moving into the final stages of their search for our new Rector. The Committee has been interviewing candidates, reviewing references, and observing the candidates in the pulpit. The Committee has recommended a single candidate to the Vestry to be called as our new Rector. The hope is to have a new Rector in place by November! We should all express our appreciation to the Committee for their dedication to their mission and give thanks to God for the guidance he has provided to the Committee.

There have been many new faces in church over the summer. Several have indicated an interest in becoming members. We should be thankful for the congregation's warm reception of these new faces and for God sending them our way.

In the area of Building and Grounds, we should be thankful for the many parishioners who have given their time and talents toward supervising and performing the many tasks making possible the completion of many improvements and repairs to our buildings and grounds. I will not attempt to lists all the many projects, large and small, or all of the parishioners who have been involved in these projects. Suffice it say, we are blessed with many talented and dedicated workers and they, with God's help, have made this a most successful year.

The largest project, the driveway and parking lot was completed with the application of the final surface coat (chip and seal with tar and brown stone) the week of September 16. I do need to give special thanks to Jess Fowler who has coordinated this work with the contractor and acted as superintendent of the works.

The columns which were required to be removed to facilitate widening of the driveway will be replaced now that the final surface coat for the driveway and parking lots have been applied. Again, we thank Jess Fowler for overseeing this project.

The dead and dying yews along the walkway from the Parish Hall to the Church have been replaced and other landscape improvements have been made in this area and around the Parish House. Sheila, Jeff, and Justin Mitchell were instrumental in getting these tasks completed.

Jayne Thomas Pinelli just completed the installation of eight new holly bushes along the east wall of the Parish House. She is always working on maintaining the shrubs and landscape elements of the grounds. We are thankful for her dedication to maintaining our beautiful landscape.

The entrance steps to the Church have been modified, with the addition of an additional row of bricks, creating a full step, making the entrance more attractive and safer. I would like to personally thank the many parishioners who made suggestions on how to design and execute this improvement. In addition, I would like to thank Patrick Evelyn for finding and directing the brick mason who did this work.

Finally, we all need to thank God for the guidance that our Interim Rector Doug has provided, and, in particular, for Doug

spurring us on and keeping us on course in order to accomplish all the many good things we have done over the last year.

Direct us, O Lord, in all our doing with thy most gracious favor, and further us with thy continual help; that in all our works begun, continued and ended in thee, we may glorify thy holy Name, and finally, by thy mercy, obtain everlasting life, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. BCP

We Salute Our Veterans

In this edition of our newsletter, we remember the faithful service of **James Frederick Douglass**, an active and loyal member of the parish for many years.

James Douglass attended university in Michigan where he met his future wife, Dorrine. He joined the Army immediately on his graduation in 1957, and just days after he completed his Advanced Infantry Training, married Dorrine and moved to Germany. At that time the saying was that "if the Army wanted you to have a wife, they would have issued you one," so James and his bride were required to live on the economy, settling in with a local German family. This challenge was met by the young couple and provided them with many good experiences and fond memories.

On returning to the USA, he was released from active duty and shortly thereafter, joined the Air Force Reserve. He attended OCS and was called to active duty on numerous occasions, serving in overseas assignments, one of which was in Japan. Like many members of the military reserve forces, he combined his civilian knowledge with his Air Force expertise to bear on work opportunities. He taught graduate courses at Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University in Daytona Beach, Florida.

Colonel Douglass retired after more than 25 years of service. But even after that span of service, he was recalled to active duty during Operation Desert Storm and served for the duration of that conflict.

James Douglass passed from this life on October 8, 2012, having faithfully served his country, his church, and his family for 78 love-filled years. We give thanks for his life and service to all.




Now is the time to be thinking and praying about who you would like to nominate for the Vestry Class of 2023.

Advent Wreath Workshop

The Advent wreath and candles are full of symbolism tied to the Christmas season. The wreath itself, which is made of various evergreens, signifies continuous life. The circle of the wreath, which has no beginning or end, symbolizes the eternity of God, the immortality of the soul, and the everlasting life we find in eternity of God, the immortality of the soul, and the everlasting life we find in Christ. Even the individual evergreens that make up the wreath have their own meanings that can be adapted to our faith. The laurel signifies victory over per-

secution and suffering. The pine, holly, and yew signify immortality and the cedar signifies strength and healing. The pine cones that decorate the wreath symbolize life and resurrection. The wreath as a whole is meant to remind us of both the immortality of our souls and God's promise of everlasting life to us through Christ.

The candles also have their own special significance. The four candles represent the four weeks of Advent, and one candle is lit each Sunday. Three of the candles are purple because the color violet is a liturgical color that signifies a time of prayer, penance, and sacrifice.

The first candle, which is purple, symbolizes **hope**. It is sometimes called the "Prophecy Candle" in remembrance of the prophets, especially Isaiah, who foretold the birth of Christ. It represents the expectation felt in anticipation of the coming Messiah. the coming Messiah.

The second candle, also purple, represents faith. It is called the "Bethlehem Candle" as a reminder of Mary and Joseph's journey to Bethlehem.


The third candle is pink and symbolizes joy. It is called the "Shepherd's Candle," and is pink because rose is a liturgical color for joy. The third Sunday of Advent is meant to remind us of the joy that the world experienced at the birth of Jesus, as well as the joy that the faithful have reached the midpoint of Advent.

On the fourth week of Advent, we light the final purple candle to mark the final week of prayer and penance as we wait for the birth of our Savior. This final candle, the "Angel's Candle," symbolizes peace. It reminds us of the message of the angels: "Peace on Earth, Good Will Toward Men."

The white candle is placed in the middle of the wreath and lit on Christmas Eve. This candle is called the "Christ




