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From the Rector's Desk

Greetings from the 221st Annual Council of the Diocese of Virginia! Originally scheduled to meet at the Hyatt Regency in Reston January 21-23, it was delayed because of a blizzard and met on March 5 in The Church of the Epiphany in Herndon. I want to use this space to talk about two of the resolutions passed at that session.

R-1: Justice, Pay Equity, and Leadership

Adopted; text pending final review

Resolved, that this 221st Council of the Diocese of Virginia supports pay and pension equity and equitable hiring practices for all women clergy in the Diocese of Virginia; and be it further

Resolved, that the Bishop is hereby asked to establish a task force to report and to issue recommendations to the 222nd Annual Diocesan meeting for diocesan, regional, and parish -level actions to address pay and pension disparities; and be it further

Resolved, the work of the task force will include data analysis and identification of best practices to provide context for their recommendations.

Now...this would seem to be self-evident. We all support equal pay for equal work, regardless of gender. The first "Resolved" seems to be calling for an ecclesiastical "Rooney rule" as in the NFL, where teams have to interview at least one minority candidate for a vacant head coaching position. Nothing wrong with that; if two men and two women apply for a vacant "head coach" (oops—Rector!) position, the Diocese can certainly require that search committee to interview at least one woman. But addressing "pay and pension disparities" is a fool's errand. The Diocese recommends salary ranges, but churches are autonomous in this, and they determine salaries.

R-3: No Guns in God's House

Adopted; text pending final review

Resolved, that the Diocese of Virginia continues to support the strengthening of measures that address the reduction of gun violence; and further

Resolved, that lay and ordained leaders in each parish in the Diocese of Virginia be aware of the statutes regarding weapons in places of worship, educate their parishioners regarding the issue of gun violence, and prayerfully consider how they can work to reduce the possibility of gun violence through measures such as the creation of "safe spaces" on church property; and further

Resolved, that the 221st Diocesan Council recommends that no firearms of any kind or other dangerous weapons shall be permitted during worship services or meetings for religious purposes in the facilities of any church or diocesan institution in the Diocese of Virginia except for law enforcement purposes, humane animal control, and other circumstances as determined by lay and ordained leaders.

The discussion of this one used up about forty-five minutes, mostly civil and courteous, but with clear differences of opinion. At least one person recognized cultural differences—firearms have different meanings in, say, Alexandria vs. New Kent. But the best part of it all is that it's already addressed in the Code of Virginia! It was unnecessary and, for many people, inflammatory.

§ 18.2-283. Carrying dangerous weapon to place of religious worship.

If any person carry any gun, pistol, bowie knife, dagger or other dangerous weapon, without good and sufficient reason, to a place of worship while a meeting for religious purposes is being held at such place he shall be guilty of a Class 4 misdemeanor.

Code 1950, § 18.1-241; 1960, c. 358; 1962, c. 411; 1975, cc. 14, 15. *(This evidently means something to attorneys!)*

A Music Note:

Our music theme for this year is “He Who Sings, Prays Twice.” During our Morning Prayer services we’ve started to sing more by singing the *Venite*, which is one of the Psalms, and the *Canticles*, which are songs and prayers of the prophets. At times we sing the Psalm, which as you may know, the Book of Psalms is the original hymnal. During Rite II we sing the refrain from “On Eagles’ Wings” as a prayerful conclusion of our Holy Eucharist service. In April we will sing *Psalm 23* on Good Shepherd Sunday, which is arguably the most well known of all the Psalms. The choir is doing a great job leading and the voice of the congregation is getting stronger with every service. God is listening to our prayers.

On Lent 4 the choir beautifully sang the anthem, “Make Me a Channel of Your Peace,” a Prayer of St. Francis. This song was originally written by Sebastian Temple; however, the arrangement we sang was created by Martin Neary for the funeral of Diana, Princess of Wales in 1997. I’ll conclude with the lyrics to this prayerfully sung anthem.

Make me a channel of your peace: where there is hatred let me bring your love, where there is injury, your pardon, Lord, and where there’s doubt, true faith in you.

Make me a channel of your peace: where there’s despair in life let me bring hope, where there is darkness, only light, and where there’s sadness, ever joy.

Make me a channel of your peace: it is in pardoning that we are pardoned, in giving of ourselves that we receive, and in dying that we’re born to eternal life.

O Master, grant that I may never seek so much to be consoled as to console, to be understood as to understand, to be loved, as to love with all my soul.

Make me a channel of your peace: where there is hatred let me bring your love, where there is injury, your pardon, Lord, and where there’s doubt, true faith in you.

Sabbatical FAQs

As many of you know Fr. Paul will be taking some time away from his duties as St. Peter's Rector this year. The Vestry has worked with Fr. Paul to enable him to take a three-month Sabbatical in order to rest, relax, and be spiritually renewed.

I'm sure many of you have questions about this Sabbatical, therefore we have developed a list of questions and answers for you in hopes of giving you a better understanding of what this means for everyone at St. Peter's. If you have additional questions after reading this, please talk with Fr. Paul, the Wardens, or your Vestry representative.

What is a Sabbatical? The dictionary states that a Sabbatical is an extended period of paid leave from one's customary work, especially for rest or to give an extended period of time for concentrated study.

What does the Diocese of Virginia say about a Sabbatical? The Diocese of Virginia recommends a periodic Sabbatical for clergy. The Sabbatical is a healthy and effective means of preventing burn-out and of renewing and enhancing a priest's capabilities for dealing effectively with the stresses of a 24 x 7 job. A Sabbatical is recommended for parish priests every 5-7 years. In Fr. Paul's Letter of Agreement, he is allowed a three-month Sabbatical after five years of service. Having started his tenure at St. Peter's in October 2006, Fr. Paul has been the Rector for over nine years and is past due for taking his Sabbatical.

How long will Fr. Paul be gone? Fr. Paul's Sabbatical will begin on Sunday, May 1 and he will return to his duties in the parish office on August 1. Fr. Paul will resume conducting services on Sunday, August 7 at the Annual Parish Picnic at the Davis Farm.

What will Fr. Paul do during the Sabbatical? Fr. Paul plans to spend time relaxing, reconnecting, and renewing during the three months. He plans to travel, read, study, and reconnect with old friends and towards the latter part of the Sabbatical he will take a week long class at Nashotah House, one of our Episcopal seminaries, located in Nashotah, Wisconsin. The course is "Thomas Cranmer: Liturgy and Legacy." He was the Archbishop of Canterbury 1533-1556 and was the author of the first two editions of the BOOK OF COMMON PRAYER.

Who will be in the pulpit on Sunday mornings? The Vestry has arranged for a long-term supply priest for the duration of Fr. Paul's Sabbatical. The Rev. Dr. J. Douglas Wigner, who was Rector of St. Peter's from 1990 to 1997, will officiate at Sunday Services during Fr. Paul's absence. Many of you know Doug and his wife Nancy from their time here and others may have met him on past Sundays when he has served as a supply priest. We welcome Rev. Wigner and appreciate his ministry to the parish during Fr. Paul's absence.

What if I need a minister during Fr. Paul's Sabbatical? Rev. Wigner will be available to perform necessary services such as funerals, hospital visits, or home visits. We will also be able to draw on the services of the Dean of Region IX, The Very Rev. April Greenwood of Westover Parish in the event of emergencies.

Who should I contact if I need a priest or have questions about the operation of the parish? We ask that you contact the church office, either of the Wardens, or any member of the Vestry should you have need for a priest or have any other questions during Fr. Paul's Sabbatical. It is important that we respect the Sabbatical as a time for Fr. Paul to be disconnected from the day-to-day needs of the parish, so we ask that you not call him directly during this time. The Wardens will make a determination to inform Fr. Paul of any events of which he should be aware.

Does this mean I should avoid Fr. Paul and Cynthia if I see them around the community? No! Fr. Paul and Cynthia will be spending some time at home during his Sabbatical and it is likely you will see them around the county. Say "Hello!" Ask how they are doing. Treat them as you would at any other time.

How is the Sabbatical being funded? Fr. Paul will continue to receive his regular pay and benefits during his Sabbatical. Additionally, the Vestry has included funding for the supply clergy and has also set aside \$1200 towards Fr. Paul's travel and educational expenses in the 2016 budget.

How can I financially support Fr. Paul's Sabbatical? The Vestry has established a Sabbatical Fund to support expenses associated with Fr. Paul's Sabbatical to which parishioners may contribute. This fund will be used to support Fr. Paul's travel, educational, and other expenses. You may donate to the Sabbatical Fund by making checks payable to St. Peter's Parish Church and writing "Sabbatical Fund" on the notation line.

Adult Forum

The Adult Forum's "Spring Break" continues through Easter Day, March 27. We resume our journey on Sunday, April 3, in the Mullins Room. We completed our review of BEYOND BELIEF by Dr. Elaine Pagels and are now ready to dive into the Gospel of Thomas. So if you have not joined us yet, please consider attending.

The Gospel of Thomas was considered a heresy by the editors of the New Testament in the third century. Why? No baptism story, no resurrection story, just a list of 114 sayings attributed to Jesus of Nazareth according to followers of his disciple Thomas, (Yes, doubting Thomas!) but remember that during this story in the Canonical Gospels, Jesus then took Thomas to a separate room and had a chat with him.

So we will be discussing the "GoT" line by line each Sunday from April 3 until May 22, our last class. On May 8, we will start 10 minutes late so the class can enjoy the first 10 minutes of the reception in Richardson Hall.

Just so you know what we are discussing, here are the first four verses of the Gospel of Thomas:

Prologue: These are the secret words which the living Jesus spoke, and which Didymus Judas Thomas wrote down.

Saying 1: And he said: He who shall find the interpretation of these words shall not taste of death.

Saying 2: Jesus said: He who seeks, let him not cease seeking until he finds; and when he finds he will be troubled, and when he is troubled he will be amazed, and he will reign over the All.

Saying 3: Jesus said: If those who lead you say to you: See, the kingdom is in heaven, then the birds of the heaven will go before you; if they say to you: It is in the sea, then the fish will go before you. But the kingdom is within you, and it is outside of you. When you know yourselves, then you will be known, and you will know that you are the sons of the living Father. But if you do not know yourselves, then you are in poverty, and you are poverty.

Giving Back – a Little Goes a Long Way!

The “Work and Wisdom” team, part of the Stewardship Commission, recently published a booklet of outreach and volunteer opportunities. The submissions included in the “blue book” are areas where St. Peter’s help would be most beneficial within our community and serving our citizens. The selections in the book were submitted by area churches and organizations.

One of outreach opportunities listed is the Mobile Food Pantry in West Point. This effort is a partnership between FeedMore and the United Way of Greater Williamsburg and serves residents of New Kent, King William, King and Queen, and West Point. On February 18, I had the chance to volunteer at the Food Pantry. I was astounded at the scope of this effort. It was far bigger than I expected. Healthy foods were provided to 144 households or a total of 336 individuals. February 2016 was the third largest month in the six months of the West Point Food Distribution.

As I bagged canned peaches, I couldn’t help but notice that the vast majority of recipients were seniors. I later learned that the number of seniors is 95%. Many individuals appeared to have some type of disability, and I’m sure they have been making choices between buying medicine or food.

It was a rewarding experience, one that words can’t always describe, and I plan to go back. The March distribution was in West Point at the National Armory, and there will be future opportunities as well. It doesn’t take much time—maybe two hours. Volunteers typically arrive at 10:30 am; food distribution is from 11 am to 12 noon. Please consider helping out another time.

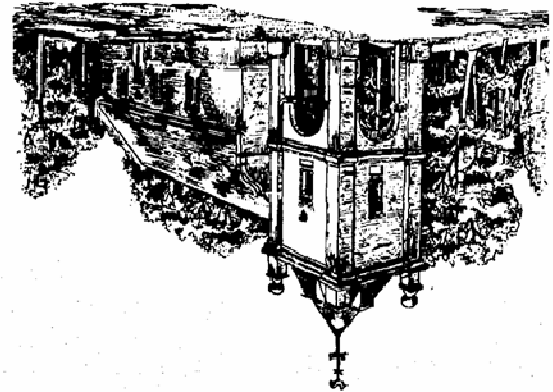
